Overview of Alliance Working Group activities

Bitumen Sprayer Calibration

A draft ODMR policy for implementation of the national sprayer calibration system has been developed. This draft policy is being circulated for consultation with industry through the Alliance. Feedback will be given at the Reference Group meeting in May.

Revised SM14 Specification review

The first of the field trials has been laid within Metropolitan District by Boral at Birkdale Road, Redlands. Field data from the trial is currently being collated and reviewed by the task group with first impressions being positive.

Education: 10% training levy

Proposals are being developed on a "deeming" formula appropriate to seals and asphalt contracts. High materials costs in road surfacing projects makes the training hours very difficult to achieve.

HMA in SEO

In mid March 2003 the industry and major clients met to review the performance of asphalt in the South East of Queensland. Supported by national AAPA technical and operational resources the meeting openly aired the concerns and issues facing the users of asphalt.

A combined working group of experts at the meeting reviewed the findings and provided direction to AAPA and Main Roads in the form of report on important actions and priorities.

Key is the need to decrease the field permeability of all Main Roads mixes and to ensure that the mix and pavement design prevent the ingress of moisture. Detailed investigations into the causes are being considered but the success achieved in NSW with the introduction of hydrated lime offers a short term solution.

It is expected that current and planned hot-mix asphalt projects will make provision for the greater densification and the addition of hydrated lime which should be confirmed through on-site trials.



Register of Approved Asphalt Suppliers

This project is progressing as planned. The improved system in the draft manual has commenced trialling on asphalt projects in four Main Roads Districts. Performance reports are being evaluated, including other feedback received from these trials. This will lead to further development of the draft manual.

Information on field experience being compiled.

Innovation

Project concept stage—will expand on the QDMR TIPES approach promoting product development and risk sharing.

Register of seal design and construction

New project intended to give the alliance partners the benefits in seals that are arising from the register of asphalt suppliers.

Districts increased involvement

When asked if the alliance could improve on communications with the districts these were some of the replies:

- The sharing of information seems to have dropped although those close to the projects are up-to-date.

- Communication between senior alliance representatives and the field offices should be improved.
- Activities being undertaken successfully in the districts are being missed by the alliance.

Relationship building on asphalt contracts



"There is no doubt that a strong partnering a recent asphalt overlay project on the Warwick side of Cunningham's gap" according to Peter Evans the Main Roads Superintendent for the project. "Right from the start, the project faced some serious challenges. The job is flanked on both sides by a World Heritage listed National Park. There were already concerns that the park was being seriously polluted, and National Parks people were concerned about the possibility of further oil and fuel leaks. Main Roads staff were particularly keen to maintain and enhance an excellent relationship with National Parks and Wildlife service. (NP&W)

There were serious concerns for safety, both for construction workers and motorists, with almost 4000 vehicles per day, with over 25% heavy vehicles daily traveling though the mountainous terrain of the Gap.

The risk was increased by being in a rural area and the job specific asphalt, manufactured in a mobile plant, did not allow Main Roads or the contractor to draw on previous experience.

We conducted a full facilitated partnering workshop, with the following people:

Boral - the contractor, MR Environmental staff, Roadtek - for traffic control, RS&E - for inspection services, NP&W, MR WH&S officer, Superintendent and his staff.

In this workshop, we established the relationship contributed to the overall success of communication links for the project, agreed on escalation times, and solved (in advance) many of the problems we were likely to encounter using a "rocks in the road" exercise. We were careful to distinguish between the roles of "observors" - the various advisors on the job, and those with delegated powers under the contract, so that these powers and responsibilities were clearly understood.

> The contract proceeded extremely smoothly, with no reported accidents at all, and very favourable comment from National Parks staff. We were also very impressed with the professional approach taken by Boral throughout the contract. They achieved excellent compliance with our specifications.

> " Some failures were observed in the asphalt just before Christmas 2002. Boral milled and replaced the failed areas, and so far we have had no further failures. Early indications, from an RS&E investigation, are that the problem was due to stripping of the binder caused by excessive permeability. To address this problem in the future, we need to reduce the permeability, and use asphalt which is less sensitive to stripping.

> " As a district representative on the joint MR/ AAPA team set up to resolve these issues. I am extremely impressed with the commitment by industry and RS&E to fix these problems, and I am confident that we will succeed in this task."


